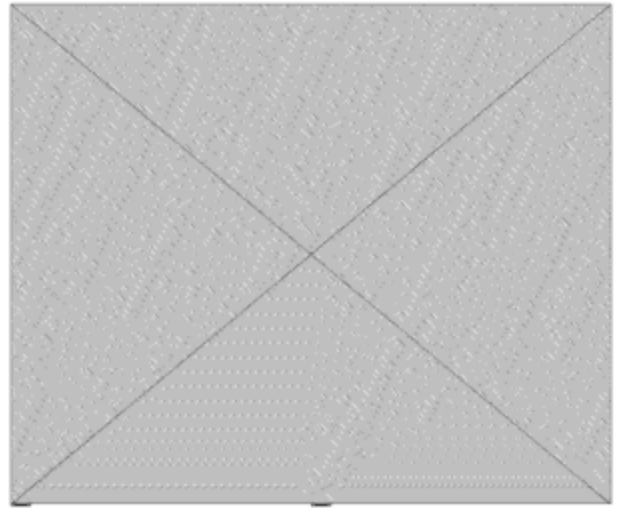

Did You Know?

You may have accurately guessed that *satiety* is related to [satisfy](#), [satiety](#) (which means "to satisfy fully or to excess"), and [sate](#) (which means "to glut" or "to satisfy fully"). *Satiety*, along with the others, ultimately comes from the Latin word *satis*, which means "enough." English speakers apparently couldn't get enough of *satis* words in the 15th and 16th centuries, when all of these words entered the English language. *Satiety* itself was borrowed into English in the mid-1500s from

French word *satiété* of the same meaning.

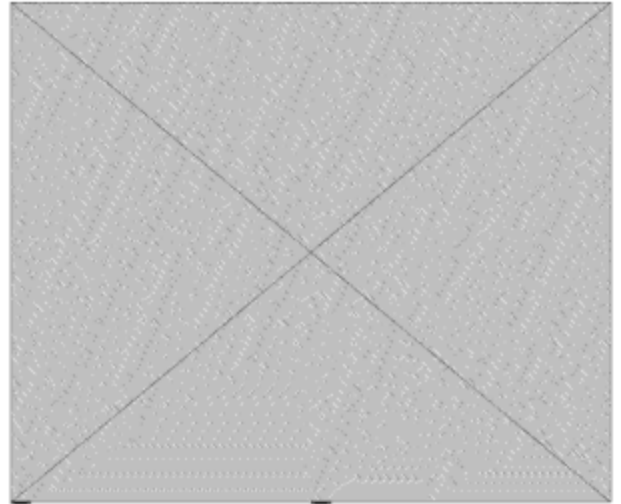

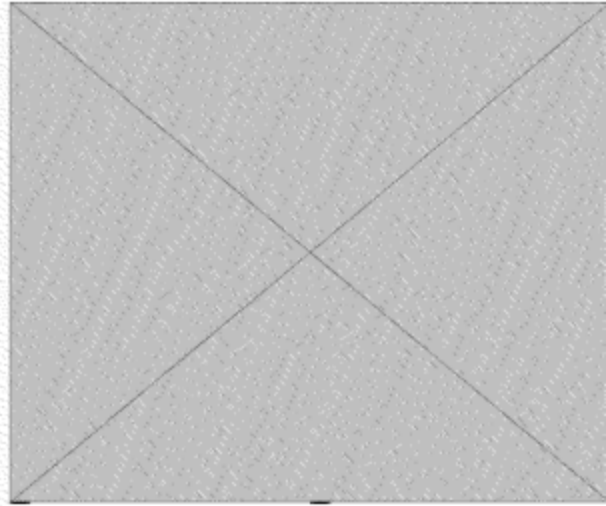
