He went back there for the month of July, leading a group of university and high school teachers on a Fulbright-Hays grant aimed at improving teaching about Middle-Eastern cultures. A tiring but enriching experience. Besides that he was in Istanbul (one of his favorite places), New York City, North Carolina and Florida. But perhaps his big news is that he became an American citizen after having had a ‘green card’ for 34 years! It must be some sort of a record for procrastination.

Karen continues her landscaping work, which includes a medium-long list of pro bono stuff along with a short list of paid work.
